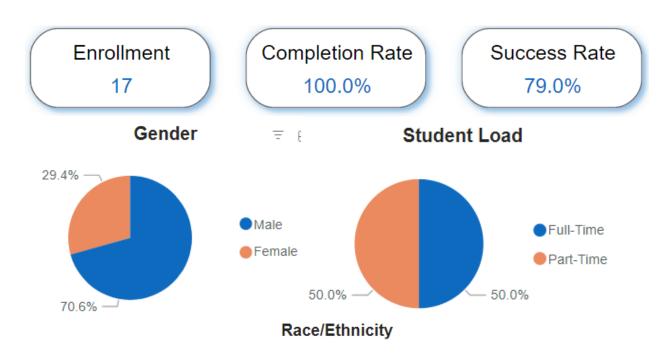

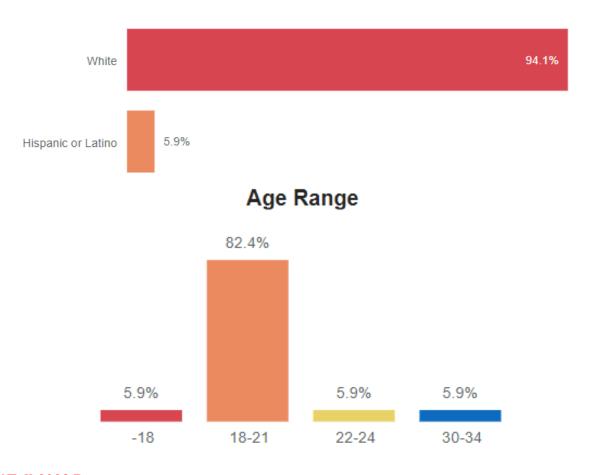

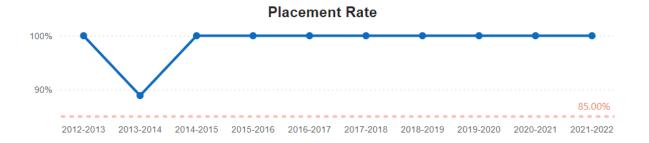

 The Career and Technical Education Navigator promotes the Farm and Ranch Management program along with all other CTE programs at all high schools in Vernon College's service area, many junior high schools, career fairs, and various community events, fully funded by the Office of Instructional Services through the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Grant.

K. Serving students from special populations:

Ricky asked Michael to review the definitions of special populations and the services available to those who apply.

Vernon College is an open-enrollment college. The Proactive Assistance for Student Services (PASS) department offers many services for documented disabilities such as but not limited to quiet testing, longer testing times, interpreters, and special equipment.

Vernon College has a program titled "New Beginnings" for students who qualify to receive transportation, childcare, and/or textbook loans. Perkins funding is also offering assistance to break down barriers such as uniform, supply, and equipment costs.

Peer to Peer mentoring, tutoring (online and in-person), resume building, student success series, and counseling are just a few of the other options/services available to students.
