Rodney Ryalls opened it up for discussion on the SCANS, General Education, and Program Matrices.

There was discussion about whether the students have to do any testing to begin the program, to prove that they are capable of completing the program. Mrs. Feldman answered that question by stating that they students do take the Acuplacer test which is the closest we could find to the

testing they do at the Wichita Falls Fire Academy. They do not have a minimum score as of right now, however they do use it to help guide the students in areas they may need extra help.

A question was posed of the possibility of adding a minimum score requirement if we see that students that are not passing the test and then not passing the final test.

Mr. Long discussed a test for students to enter the program. Mrs. Drury stated that at a Level I Certificate they could have a test but they would not be able to set a minimum. The only way to do that is at a Level II certificate. The advisory committee can make the decision to have a minimum cut score on an Acuplacer exam.

A question was asked about the General Education Matrix and how often those are changed. Mrs. Drury stated those are not changed and they are documented yearly. However, the Program Outcome Matrix is mandates that this committee can change if a change needs to be made. If the change was made at this meeting it would not be put into place until the next fall classes.

Rodney Ryalls asked for a motion to approve the matrices as presented. Blake Gulley made motion to approve the matrices as presented. David Mounsey seconded the motion.
